Canada Learning Bond - RESP Money



The <u>Canada Learning Bond</u> (CLB) is FREE money that the Government adds to Registered Education Savings Plans (RESP) for children from low-income families. This money helps to pay the costs of a child's full- or part-time studies after high school and can be used for:

apprenticeship programs and trade schools

colleges and universities

No personal contributions to an RESP are required to receive the CLB. You just have to <u>open</u> <u>an RESP account</u> at a bank (no fees) and then apply for it.



• up to \$2000 per student deposited into RESP

- no cost to families
- banks do the application
- pro-rated amounts depending on family income
- this year's threshold is about \$53,000.
- get \$500 up front, and then up to \$100/yr depending on income each yr.
